
The Freedom of Information Act


The Freedom of Information Act, known as the FOIA, is a law that gives any person the right to request federal agency records. The FOIA also requires federal agencies to make certain types of information available to the public without the need to submit a request.

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FOIA at Your Agency

FOIA is everyone's responsibility. Any documents you create or maintain as part of your job may be responsive to a FOIA request. FOIA professionals at your agency will receive and respond to requests, but they may call on you for assistance in searching for responsive records and reviewing those records for release.
